How to register to vote

To register to vote, you need to fill out and send in a voter registration affidavit. You must re-register if you have moved since the last election or if you have legally changed your name.

Where to Find the Voter Registration Forms

Forms are kept at all City or County Clerk's offices, U.S. Post Offices, public libraries and many state offices. There's a copy in the State of Hawai'i tax booklet and the Verizon Oahu yellow pages. You also can register when you apply for or renew your driver's license. The form can be downloaded from the Office of Elections Web page (<http://www.hawaii.gov/elections>) or from HFF's own website, www.hawaiifamilyforum.org.

Registration Deadlines

Deadlines for registering to vote in the 2004 elections are August 19 for the primary election and October 4 for the general election.

Where to Vote

Registered voters in the State of Hawaii will receive a voter registration notice prior to the election. The notice lists all the applicable information—district/precinct number and location polling place. Questions regarding registration may be directed to the following City/County Clerk (area):

Any person registered to vote may cast an absentee ballot. If you cannot vote at your polling place for any reason or you will be absent from the State of Hawaii on election day, you may vote using an absentee ballot. You may also vote at an absentee walk-in polling place before election day. Forms are available at: www.hawaii.gov/elections or see your church contact.
